
Cruise to Palm Ridge for rockin' journey through music history

World War II veteran, SCW resident turns 100

St. Patrick's Day meant a little something more to Sun City West resident Pat Doe who recently celebrated his 100th birthday.

Born March 17, 1923, "Little Patty" – a nickname given by the nurses who attended his birth and stuck throughout his life – attribute his longevity to three things: having a good wife, not smoking and drinking good scotch.

He married his wife of 48 years, Margaret "Peggy" Doe, in his 50s and the couple have five children.

Pat enlisted in the US Army in 1942, inspired to do so by Pearl Harbor, one year after the attack. He flew as a Reserve Officer, as there was no Air Force at that time. He graduated to a twin engine fighter pilot in preparation for D-Day in 1944. But, at that time, Dec. 16, 1944, when the German army surrounded the Americans at Bastogne, Belgium, Pat took off with other American airmen and held the Germans off until Gen.



Patton arrived and the Americans won the battle.

Once off active duty, Pat enrolled in the University of California, Berkeley, but continued on reserve, flying on the weekends. He was eventually hired at Safeway Manufacturing.

When the Korean war started Pat was back to active duty and assigned to pilot a B-47 bomber off the coast of Alaska, carrying an atomic bomb. He was trained to manually go back in the plane and arm it if necessary. Pat then transferred to Fairfield, Calif., and became a Management Engineering Officer, but then received orders to go to

Travis Air Force base with a job as a B-36 pilot. There he gained the "4-Headed Monster" status wearing sets of wings for being a navigator, bombardier, radar, and pilot. The rest of his service he flew B-47s.

Before moving to Sun City West, Pat and Peggy lived in Sun City. Pat would visit Sun City West for golf tournaments and decided he wanted to live near that course. He still enjoys golf and gardening, and is a past member of the Silvercraft and Lapidary clubs.

Hot topics during budget season!

The Recreation Centers of Sun City West budget for fiscal year 2023-2024 is reaching its final stages as the budget assumptions get refined and as the various standing committees make their final recommendations to the Governing Board.

In an earlier article, I discussed the various concerns that are impacting the proposed budget. Briefly, the continuing high rate of inflation that has affected our energy costs, chemical and fertilizer costs does not look like it will have any relief in the short term. Minimum wage increases are scheduled again for next January as Arizona works its way to a minimum wage of \$15 per hour. The RCSCW health and workman's comp policies have seen very hefty increases. It remains difficult to recruit and retain peo-

ple for the various jobs needed to keep our facilities open and up to our standards.

Several topics are still being discussed as we work our way to the May vote to approve the

Any budget process looks at past performance and tries to predict future requirements. Without a reliable crystal ball to see the future, the budget is based on certain assumptions about what can be reasonably expected to happen next year.

The standing committees of the Governing Board have made recommendations in their areas, but it is up to the Governing Board Directors to review the recommendations and provide the final approval. The Governing Board has challenged some of the budget assumptions and has made the General Manager and his staff aware of these con-

Besides rejecting several new capital projects, the Board has adopted a "plan for the worst, hope for the best" approach to next year's budget. This means managing revenue expectations.

Starting with expenses, while there are areas of expense that have increased beyond our control, the General Manager has been tasked to employ cost saving measure wherever he can, without diminishing the level of service that our members expect.

There are three main revenue streams into the coffers of RCSCW; Member dues, golf fees and the Asset Preservation Fee assessed to home title changes.

> Asset Preservation Fee (APF) funds our repair and replacement responsibilities, the activities that keep our facilities looking good and in good repair. On average, over the past several years we have recorded around 1,200 APFs per year. The past year is tracking about 20 percent lower in home sales due to the inflationary effect on mortgage rate. The Budget and Finance committee recommended reducing the assumption of 1,200 APFs to just over 1,000. This reduction while rea-

sonable given the market conditions, remove \$840,000 from the projected revenue stream. A good portion of this deficit will be made up by an increase the Asset Preservation Fee next year. On the upside, if we exceed the projected number of APFs next year, that money will go directly into the Reserve Fund.

Since COVID, our golf rounds have increased from an average of 285,000 per year, to over 320,000 in the last two years. Our golf rounds are off this year, so the Golf Committee has recommended reducing the projected number of golf rounds from 325,000 to around 310,000. Again, a smart reconsideration, but it too has a negative affect on the golf revenue. This reduction in estimated round has a negative effect of over \$400,000 to the projected golf revenue. Some of this will be made up in an increase in golf rates for outside players during the peak October to April season. While outside rates will increase, the golf committee was cautious about not pricing our courses out of their attractive pricing position and affecting the over \$2 million dollars that outside play con-

John Meeker:

Former mail clerk leaves lasting impression

Meeker Boulevard is a major thoroughfare in Sun City West. Who was John Meeker, and why is a street named after him?

John Meeker was born in 1926, and at the age of 12, he started working as a golf caddy. At the Phoenix Golf Club, he became the favorite caddy of one of the members, Del E. Webb.

When Meeker finished high school, he was called into the military because of World War II. Webb had told Meeker to contact him when he was discharged, and he could have a job in the Webb organization.

Meeker decided not to attend Arizona State University, but contacted Webb's company, where he was hired as an assistant mail clerk. The Webb Company was pleased with his excellent work, and he advanced up the corporate ladder. Soon he reached the level of corporate vice



president because DEVCO liked to promote from within the company. He ultimately ended up as president after Webb died.

Meeker was given the task of building Sun City West. He wanted the new community to have all the attractions of the successful Sun City, with many improvements.

tributes to our revenue. If our number of golf rounds exceeds the reduced projection, that excess revenue also goes in the Reserve Fund to help fund our upcoming irrigation projects.

The elephant in the room is the amount of dues increase that needs to be in effect for next year. Revenue from Member dues mainly finances the day-to-day operation of the RCSCW. No one can argue with the effect that inflation has had on all our pocket-books. The operations at RCSCW are impacted by those same dynamics. As we plan for the "worst," we must all bear the burden of keeping RCSCW up to date and providing the services of which we can all be proud.

Post Script: The figures in this article are subject to change before the final budget is voted on by the Governing Board in May.

To address some of the comments that we are already hearing:

- This Governing Board has not "Rubber Stamped" anything that the General Manager has proposed.
- This Governing Board has removed several millions of dollars of Capital Projects that were wants versus needs.
- This Governing Board approaches our fiduciary responsibilities seriously, with clear vision and level heads.

A popular attraction in Sun City was the Sun Bowl, an open-air bandstand with an open field in front of it that could accommodate up to 7,000 people. However, it had the problems of occasional cattle odors, aircraft noise, and heat and cold.

Meeker decided to build an enclosed air-conditioned theater in Sun City West with the same capacity (7,000 seats) and call it the Sundome. It would be the largest single-level theater in the United States. Meeker personally selected the deluxe seats. He also increased the spacing of the rows (40") so late arrivers could walk to their seats without the need for others in the row to stand. This generous spacing caused the rear row to be 200 feet back from the stage, much farther than most theaters.

However, the Sundome was not equipped with enough dressing rooms or fly space over the stage to accommodate Broadway-type shows. Eventually, the Sundome's expenses - a million dollars a year - were beyond what residents wanted to pay, so the theater was sold, demolished and replaced with the Fry's store.

Meeker made other improvements in Sun City West. Power lines and communication cables were buried, getting rid of unattractive power poles. The homes had better insulation and higher ceilings. John Meeker deserves the credit for the outstanding reputation Sun City West enjoys today.

Have Posse check home during summer

It's that time of year when our winter visitors begin their annual exodus to more comfortable climes. The

Sun City West
Posses want to remind those > leaving that we offer a va-

cation watch program at no cost to you. Once a resident signs up, a trained Posse person will periodically check the house by walking around the perimeter of the property and check to make sure that all doors and windows are locked, there is no damage from storms and no evidence of criminal activity. If it is necessary to enter the home, a Sheriff's Deputy will be called and the Posse will attempt to notify persons of record on file with the Posse.

Signing up can be done in one of two ways. First, register online by logging on to the Posse web site at scwposse.org and click on the Vacation Watch tab. Fill out the form then scroll down and click on submit. Make sure that the leave and return dates are entered. Otherwise, the form will not be accepted. If a return date is not known, enter Dec. 31. Then call the Posse at 623-584-5808 when the actual date is known.

Or, visit the Posse at 20450 Stardust Blvd. (corner of R.H. Johnson and Stardust boulevards) and fill out a white card. Again, make sure the leave and return dates are entered and that the card is signed and dated. Give it to the receptionist who will deliver it to the Vacation Watch office for data entry into the computer.

Some people plan to leave and return several times over the course of the summer. The Posse program requires that a new log on entry or white card be submitted for each vacation set of dates. Only one set of dates can be submitted at any one time.



Frequently Asked Questions

Bunkers: Touching Sand in Bunker with Club

Q: May I touch the sand with my club when my ball is in a bunker?

A: Touching the sand with your club immediately in front of or behind your ball, during a practice swing or during your backswing is a penalty (see Rule 12.2b(1)). If you do this, you get a loss of hole penalty in match play or two penalty strokes in stroke play. Other touching of the sand in a bunker is generally ok, as long as you are not deliberately testing the condition of the sand.
