

Use pre-emergent to avoid a larger weed problem

The CC&R department is reminding homeowners that now is the time of year when weeds are growing. They have started to pop up in yards all around our community.



The pre-emergent should be "watered down" after applying to get down to the seeds and prevent germination from taking place.

Once you see the weeds growing, applying a preemergent will not kill them. At that point you need to apply a "post-emergent." (Please note that most weed killers must have a certain temperature to be effective - read the product label).

Also, the weeds we are seeing this year are part of the sunflower, tumbleweed, or native plant families, and some weed killers will not work on them. A special formulation may be needed to kill these weeds. Ask an exterminator.

Eliminating weeds is a threestep process:

• Step one - Apply a preemergent.

• Step two - Apply a weed killer as quickly as possible to prevent the weeds from developing and dropping seeds.

• Step three - Remove the dead weeds from your yard after they have died.



A pet-friendly option is available: Vinegar is also an effective weed killer. Unlike commercial weed killers, vinegar is ecofriendly and won't harm the environment, people or pets.

Also, add table salt to vinegar to destroy weeds forever!

Just make sure not to use salt on soil in a location you may ever want something to grow, as the solution will make sure that nothing grows in that spot again.


1. Pour 1 gallon of white vinegar into a bucket. Everyday 5 to 10 percent household white vinegar is fine for this weed killer.

2. Add 1 cup of table salt. Stir until all the salt dissolves completely.

3. Stir in 1 tablespoon of liquid dishwashing soap. This will act as a surface-¬active agent and will make the vinegar and salt solution adhere to the weeds more efficiently.


4. Funnel the weed killer into a plastic spray bottle.

5. Saturate the weeds with the solution on a dry, sunny day. Cover all the surfaces well with the solution. The plants soaked with this solution will die within a few days. Warning: They won't be back and nothing else will ever grow there.

Governing Board tackled pressing issues this year

Here is a wrap up of some of had years the issues the Governing Board faced this past year, as well as other topics of interest.

1. Next year's budget included a semantic accounting change to provide greater transparency of how the Reserves are funded. The change is the wording at the bottom of the revenue column from "Excess Operating Cash Inflow/Outflow" to an expense line item "Reserve Fund Allocation".

Why is this important? Our Reserve needs are primarily dictated by our Repair & Replacement schedule. The Reserve Fund is the "savings account" we maintain to repair and replace the capital items that keep our facilities bright and shiny. (Reminder - Capital items cost over \$5,000 and have a useful life of five or more years.)

Historically, using "Excess Operating Cash Inflow/Outflow" was a reactive strategy to partially fund the Reserve. It meant that any leftover operating revenue would "Inflow" directly to the Reserve fund; conversely any operating revenue shortfall would "outflow" from the Reserves.

Having a reactive strategy leaves too much uncertainty in funding the reserves. We have

w h e n houses sold well, or golf rounds exceeded expectations and the "Inflow" into the Reserves was



large. As we are seeing this year as houses are moving slower, and as golf rounds are trending down, we need a more dependable revenue stream to keep the Reserves where they should be.

Having a dedicated "Reserve Allocation" expense line item makes it easier for members to follow the money and see how their dues proactively provide funding for the Reserves, separate from the collection of APFs. By making this differentiation, RCSCW will have the flexibility to handle years with less than average operating revenues and higher than normal capital needs.

2. The Board discussed the use of an index to predict operating capital needs for the upcoming year. This goes hand in hand with separating the operating revenue from the reserve revenue. Using an index such as CPI to predict operational revenue needs, could take

some of the guess work out of the budget process. An idea to be explored next year will be finding an appropriate index for operational revenue as we look at capital revenue separately. We do this to some extent now, but some members find the budgets to date have been a blur of operation and capital revenues and expenses.

3. This year the Governing Board re-instituted GM Ops meetings once a month. These meetings have provided a less formal, more open dialogue between the General Manager and Governing Board Directors held in a roundtable format. These meetings are open to members, with prior announced agendas and minutes that are published. These meetings are briefings on a list of topics and serve to set the agendas for Workshops and Regular meetings.

4. Water was an important topic again this year, as the ADWR finalized its Fifth Management Plan. Effective in 2025, golf courses in the Phoenix Active Management Area will be restricted to 90 acres of irrigated turf. RCSCW has been anticipating these new restrictions and has held up the Grandview irrigation project until the full level of restrictions was realized.

Grandview is the first of our irrigation rebuilds, and roughly 40 acres of out-of-play turf have been removed. The new irrigation system will be an obvious enhancement over the 40+ year old system. The new heads will be programmed much more efficiently to put just the right amount of water where it is needed.

Better irrigation isn't the only alternative to saving water. New turf varieties are being explored that are more temperature resistant and use less water. But saving water takes money. RCSCW was fortunate enough to receive four grants from the Arizona Department of Tourism to help with turf reduction to the tune of over \$400,000.

Tenacious SCWesters get their post office

The next time you visit the nity – but those routes were Sun City West Post Office to mail a letter or package, you might want to stop and appreciate the tremendous effort and energy that went into creating the local facility nearly 30 years ago.

The story of the Sun City West Post Office is, indeed, a story of the incredible perseverance by a small group of Sun City West residents in the face of what many at the time considered to be insurmountable odds.

Sun City West opened to residents in 1978 and by 1985 the population had reached nearly 12,000. The United State Post Office maintained 12 delivery routes in the new commugrowing by nearly 200 homes each month!

To make things more difficult, those routes and all mail emanated from the post office in Sun City. The community had a contract station in operation at the Sundome Shopping Center, but the lack of a full-service postal station was becoming a point of frustration for residents of a growing community.

In the late 1980s, PORA officials took it upon themselves to take action - and urged residents to contact their state senators (Barry Goldwater and Dennis DeConcini) and request a solution.

As further water restrictions come down from the state and federal governments, our other large turf sporting surfaces such as lawn bowling and the softball outfield may come under pressure to convert to synthetic sport surfaces. While there will be water savings, the conversion costs would be several hundred thousand dollars each. Maybe there also will be grants available for this down the line.

5. Earlier in the year, a member alerted RCSCW that Maricopa County Flood Control Department was installing chain-link barriers and gates at the crossings of the flood control canals that run through the community. The Board held a meeting with the Maricopa County Ombudsman to discuss our dislike for chain-link fencing in a community where residents have CC&Rs prohibiting the use of chainlink fencing on their properties. The Ombudsman took our concerns back and Maricopa County reconsidered. As a result, the chain-link fencing was removed and corral type fencing was installed and painted.

6. Topics to be carried into next fiscal year include expanded video surveillance, credit card fees and abuse of Associate Member cards.

a. This year has seen continued golf cart thefts and thefts of catalytic converters outside of Membership at the R.H. Johnson campus. Video camera surveillance has been installed overlooking the parking lot with signage that warns would-be thieves as to their use. Expansion of video surveillance in other locations will be discussed.

b. Credit Card fees were a big topic discussed during this budget cycle; however, no consensus could be reached as to whether to continue to treat them as a cost of doing business or developing a policy to pass on the cost of using a credit card to the users. Over the years the fees have increased despite negotiations with credit card processors for better rates. As our revenues increase, the fees paid to processors will continue to increase. The amount paid for credit card fees will become a larger portion of our budget. Next year, the Budget & Finance Committee will be doing a deep dive into credit card fees, and avenues of potential mitigation.

c. The position of the Governing Board is that RCSCW facilities are paid for by RCSCW Cardholders and for the exclusive use of RCSCW card holders and their guests. It is alarming that some Owner-Members are circumventing our procedures to enable non-residents to obtain Associate Member cards. Our CC&R department is actively pursuing these cases.

OHOA: Educating HOA Boards in Sun City West

OHOA

The OHOA office and board Surely you had not only state have heard HOA board members state many times that they don't need any HOA training because they have previously served on a board or perhaps several. Granted, many of us came from the corporate world and, even, perhaps served on a board. However, conducting a board meeting is very different from running a homeowner association.

All homeowner associations in Sun City West are small nonprofit businesses - some with several million dollars in assets. If you owned your own business with a net worth of a million dollars, you most likely had a board of directors or key personnel to help you run your business.

(and federal) laws that needed to be followed but also established industry standards. Homeowner associations are no different. Arizona HOAs

have legal responsibilities that must be adhered to. These include not only the Sun City West CC&Rs, your own HOA's CC&Rs (which most likely have not been updated in 20 or more years), but more importantly the Arizona Revised State Statutes (aka the state laws governing HOAs in Arizona) and federal laws. HOA laws have changed a tremendous amount in the last 10 years and are becoming stricter on how an HOA is run.

In addition to specific laws that must be followed, homeowner association boards accept a fiduciary (both financial and legal) responsibility to those who elected

them to office to run it as a non-profit business and to make good decisions after careful consideration.

In Sun City West, OHOA assists our HOAs on all HOA issues, including CC&Rs. We help find answers to your questions concerning Arizona State HOA Laws, Bylaws and CC&Rs, and the HOA Bylaws and CC&Rs as they pertain to your own HOA. If you are newly elected to an

HOA board or an experienced HOA board member who has not "kept up with the times" or eager to learn more about running an effective and legal HOA, or you want to create an efficient and legal HOA board, get the information you need to put all the pieces together by attending these OHOA events this fall: the HOA Board 101, the 2024 HOA Board Leadership Academy, and the 2024 HOA Board Advanced Leadership Academy.

Serving on an HOA Board is not just another business board, it is a financial and legal responsibility to your homeowners.

Residents are using the Posse's website (scwposse.org) to sign up for the Vacation Watch program. However, the system does not recognize special characters such as "forward slash" or "back slash" (/ or \setminus). When typing, for example two names, the "slashes" are not needed.

Posse Members patrolling at night who notice an open garage door (345 last month alone) radio our Dispatch center at the Posse building in Sun City West. For your safety and information, Dispatch then calls the resident to let them know while the patrol car waits outside. If you don't want Posse to call about open garage doors, let us know by email at commander@spscw.net or call us at 623-584-5808.

Fraud is probably the most frequent and expensive crime occurring in Sun City West. Fraud is the wrongful or criminal deception intended to result in financial or personal gain. Fraud is reported to Maricopa County Sheriff's Office about once every two days on average.

Scammers try to trick you. They say they are from the government, a familiar organization, or perhaps a relative. They ask you to act quickly and not tell anyone. If they ask for "gift cards" or cash for payment it is almost always a scam. They convince you to respond to an email. Then they enter your computer to capture your passwords and empty you bank account.

If you suspect you or someone you know are being or have been scammed you are probably right. Call MCSO non- emergency line at 602-876-1011.







mending this Best Tee system based on golfer preferences, the expert opinions of industry professionals, and extensive research into golfer performance characteristics across the full spectrum of players.

To implement a Best Tee profacility gram, managers should:

• Rate all tees for all players • Avoid setup and presentation elements that discourage golfers from using certain tees

• Encourage golfers to accurately measure their average 7iron hitting distance

• Make tee recommendations part of their course's culture Essentially, golfers play Best

Tees when, if they hit a good shot on most holes, they are in the vicinity of the putting green and do not have to constantly use longer clubs on approach shots. This gives more opportunities for pars and some chances for a birdie.



Terese Farrar, who co-chairs Quilts for a Cause with Darlene Mullen, said, "Evelyn Simek is great for taking home donations that are started but not finished, or combinations of fabrics that are not sufficient, but with adding more from her stash, comes up with a beautiful (quilt) top."

Simek showed off one of her 16-patch quilt tops at a recent Quilts for a Cause meeting.

"The 16-patch is one of four that I made," Simek said, "with the 50-plus donated blocks from a friend of Cindy Stedman, (a Rip 'N' Sew member)."

And so far, Mullen has made eight quilt tops from the 100 12-inch squares donated by a friend of Sue Truax, another Rip 'N' Sew member. Truax kept the hundreds of 5inch-by-5-inch squares in the same donation to make other tops for Quilts for a Cause.

Louise Howden has made six to eight quilt tops with the fabric Lynn Craig gave her. Both women sew several times a week at Rip 'N' Sew.

Howden said she was getting bored with the things she was sewing. So Craig opened her rolling tote packed with fabric and pulled out bundles of fabric strips.

Howden has converted those strips into several variations of rail fence-patterned quilt tops.

Instead of using paper, Linda Stratton taught a Ribbon Card class using decorative woven ribbon to create a bright, modern background for cards. The cards were then embellished with die cut sentiments and shapes such as balloons, flowers and more.

Donning her instructor's hat again, Lynne Marion gave a workshop for three different styles of Easel Cards; Lynne initially taught the basic single easel card in either a horizontal or vertical layout and then showed the enthusiastic participants how to make the side-angled easel and a double easel cards. 

PORA video helped land Sun City West Post Office

The U.S. Postal Service, however, was faced with the same financial problems facing all government agencies at the time and funds were not available for new projects. In addition, the 1970 Postal Reorganization Act required the postal service to cover all costs of building and maintenance, as well as the cost of delivering mail.

The odds of Sun City West securing its own post office seemed at this point to be slim or even nonexistent.

To complicate matters, the Sun City postmaster in 1991 felt Sun City West postal needs were being adequately met by the Sun City facility and wouldn't support a separate facility in Sun City West.

The issue would have ended right there and then if it were not for a group of diligent and committed residents who refused to take no for an answer. PORA created a committee, and that committee was led by Co-Chairs Howie Wilson and Virginia Smith.

The committee circulated a petition and collected over 11,000 signatures and it was Ms. Smith – a former congresswoman from Nebraska - who traveled to Washington, D.C., and personally hand-delivered the petitions to Postmaster General Anthony Franks.

According to Ms. Smith, Mr. Franks was "surprised to see so many signatures and indicated he had no idea there was so much concern out here."

The petition convinced the postmaster general to personally visit Sun City West in September 1991. At the time, Sun City West was the 16th largest community in Arizona – yet there were 115 post offices throughout the state serving smaller communities.

To help support their cause, PORA created a video to show to the postmaster general – a video that among other things, showed crowded lines and long waits at the Sun City Post Office counters!

Despite the Del Webb Development Co. offering to donate land and construct the building, the postmaster general still resisted approving a full-standing

post office for Sun City West.

It was then that Virginia Smith and the committee launched one more letter-writing campaign that persuaded Sen. DeConcini to act on his own. He would use his position as chairman of the Senate Finance Committee to insert a line item in a general appropriations bill for \$1.1 million for a post office in Sun City West.

Oddly enough, a new postmaster general appointed by a new president, asked the Senate to increase the amount to \$5 million! With the help of Arizona's senators and representatives, the bill passed both houses and was signed by President George Bush.

The community's long road to a post office was finally nearing its end.

Initially, a 4.79-acre parcel on the corner of Camino del Sol and Meeker boulevards was chosen for a 21,000-square-foot building. PORA and others favored a five-acre site in the commercial

core at Sandridge Drive and 139th Avenue, a site that would eventually win out as the final location.

Construction began in July 1994 and the Sun City West Post Office officially opened its doors in February 1995. The post office today is located on Wilson Way, named after Co-Chair Howie Wilson.

A local newspaper published a letter by Co-Chair Howie Wilson where he thanked all those involved in the effort to secure a community post office. He finished his letter by saying the community effort "just shows what can be accomplished when we set our minds to it and work together!'
