Summertime is project time

From our residents' standpoint, August is the slowest month of the RCSCW fiscal year. Facilities see less usage than other months, and the entire community seems to slow down. The Governing Board does not have regular scheduled meetings in July or August, although we are on call.

Behind the scenes, however, the summer months, including August, are humming with activity.

At the May 25 Governing Board meeting, the fiscal year 2023-24 budget was approved. It consisted of an operational side (the day-to-day expenses of running the Association); and a capital side (which includes Repair & Replacement - R&R - items from the Reserve Study).

The Reserve Study lists all our capital items (over \$5,000, with a useful life of five years or more) throughout our campuses. The study extends out

30 years and tracks where each item is in its useful life, when it will need to be replaced and the cost to replace the item. This consti-

tutes our Repair & Replacement schedule. Each year the scheduled items are evaluated and placed in the upcoming year's capital budget. These projects are funded by the Asset Preservation Fees collected, as well as a certain portion of each member's yearly

For FY2023-24, the Governing Board approved \$5.2 million in R&R expenses.

Parking lots are big ticket expenses when it comes time to actually replace the asphalt. When a lot needs to be milled

down to the dirt and resurfaced, it is considered a capital expense. The R.H. Johnson parking lot in front of Membership and the Social Hall are scheduled to be replaced starting in late August, with completion around mid-September. Then the asphalt replacement will be done at Grandview, Beardsley Arts and Crafts lot, and finally Trail Ridge. The four projects were budgeted at a total of just under \$2 million.

To extend the life of the new asphalt, the lots will be sealed and re-striped in about 12 months. This extends the integrity of the asphalt to prevent water seeping into small cracks. The parking lots to be sealed and restriped are the Metal Shop, Stardust, Deer Valley, Kuentz and the R.H. Johnson lots from the Library to the tennis facility. Although the sealing and restriping projects are more than \$5,000 each, their useful life is under five years, so these are Operational Expenses.

A major R&R project is taking place in the Sports Pavilion as all 30 bowling lanes are being deconstructed and new lanes built. New ball return mechanisms will be installed at the same time. Due to the construction process, the entire Sports Pavilion complex will be closed through Sept. 10, in-

A Walk Through Sun Cities MUSEUM History

The Symphony in SCW

For over 25 years, classical music lovers in Sun City West had the luxury of enjoying symphonic music in their own community. Although the Symphony did not originate in, and is not currently performing in Sun City West, it did perform here for many years.

The Sun City Symphony Orchestra began in the fall of 1968, with a performance in what is now the Mountain View Auditorium with an audience of 1,000 concert goers. Performances continued in Sun City at the Sundial Auditorium until the opening of the Sundome Center for the Performing Arts in Sun City West in September 1980, with a 7,169-seat capacity. The Orchestra decided to move to the Sundome, agreeing to play the compositions of wellknown composers.

In the first season in Sun City West, the Orchestra had 3,000 yearly subscriptions. The popularity of performing the music of widely recognized composers as well as offering a program of six classical and four pops concerts each season helped the Orchestra build a large audi-

ence.

Reflecting both its new audience and location, the Orchestra changed its name to the Sun Cities Symphony in 1983. During the Symphony's peak seasons in the Sundome, as many as 5,500 season tickets were sold, exceeding the ticket sales of many large orchestras in some of the nation's largest cities.

Concert by concert, the Symphony had the best attended regular season of any symphony in the United States, and successful seasons continued in the Sundome until 2004. By then, the Del Webb Corp. had built out Sun City West and planned to withdraw financial support for the community. Sundome management decided to turn the Sundome over to Arizona State University. In December 1984, the Sundome Center for the Performing Arts was sold to the university for the price of one dollar.

When it was announced that the Sundome would eventually be closing, Symphony patrons were upset by the loss of the Symphony's permanent home. Although concerts were scheduled at Prince

Frequently Asked Questions

Interference from Boundary Objects

Q: I have interference from an out of bounds fence, stake or wall - what are my options?

A: You do not get free relief from objects that define or mark the course boundary. You may not move objects marking course boundaries or take free relief from them like you would from other artificial objects, like a cart path, a building, or a stake marking a penalty area. Your options are to play your ball as it lies, proceed under penalty of stroke and distance by playing again from the spot of your last stroke (see Rule 18.1),



or decide your ball is unplayable (see Rule 19.1).

Quilts for a Cause sewn for simplicity, artistry

A quilt is a cloth sandwich. The top piece is usually the decorated part, the filling or batting is the middle and a backing is the bottom layer. Stitching through all three layers holds them together. A binding is sewn on along all the edges to keep the layers from spilling out.


The original American quilts were utilitarian for unheated houses — used as bed covers plus hung over doors and windows to keep out the cold.

Early settlers could not afford to discard worn things. Worn quilts and blankets were patched, combined with other blankets, or used as batting between other quilts and blankets.

But then manufacturing came to America and women no longer had to make their own yarns and fabrics. That's when artistic quilting become more widespread.

Quilts for a Cause makes all kind of top pieces — from more utilitarian, beginner patterns to artistic ones. The quilt





Above, Evelyn Simek altered this quilt top. Bottom left, this colorful quilt top is a strip or string quilt. This variation has one-half of the block being a triangle of fabric. Four triangles are joined together to make it look like a square with the strips being on the outside of the block. Top right, Verda Bell pieced this black-and-white quilt top and added the appliquéd flower. Then she batted and backed the quilt before using a long-arm quilting machine to sew it all together. Finally, she added the binding. Most Quilts for a Cause quilts are sewn together and tied.

tops made by this group within Rip 'N' Sew depend on the fabric, quilts and partially completed quilts donated to the Sun City West club. Donations

> translate into more quilts made for hospices, kidney dialysis centers, first responders, veterans, nursing homes and other places.

> "The service-able quilts are just as precious to us as the drop-dead gorgeous ones," said Terese Farrar said.

She and Darlene Mullen head Quilts for a Cause.

"We have some people that work with us every time and are very prolific in making tops," Farrar said. "It just takes the eyes of certain people to make them pop! Some (people) just have the knack for color and pattern so theirs stand out."

Quilts that draw the eye can be from scraps or yardage, she said.

"Some (quilters) just like to try new patterns and others stay with their tried-and-true ones," Farrar said.

Quilts for a Cause sometimes knows nothing about tops: "We have no idea who they come from as they just show up in our cabinet," Farrar said. "I am always looking for more people to make tops and those spe-



cial ones to adjust the big ones. That does take a knack and desire.

"We are trying to have kits available of easy patterns for new people to make, so the decisions are not overwhelming," she said

Evelyn Simek is one of the quilters Farrar said has "a knack and a desire" to redo a partially made quilt top.

"The quilt came in as a donation, but it was 22 inches wide and 88 inches long! It probably was intended to be made into a king-sized bed runner," Simek said. "I took the middle seam apart, and arranged it in a square. I do like the finished quilt top, and it was a fair amount of work for whomever made it originally. For me, it only involved a little ripping, then sewing one seam. What could be easier!"

of Peace Catholic Church in Sun City West and the Glendale Auditorium, concert goers did not like the alternate, smaller venues. Ticket sales dropped as people linked the fate of the Symphony to the fate of the Sundome. Fundraising efforts could not surmount the Symphony's loss of revenue, resulting in season cancellations.

After a two-year hiatus and reorganization as a more intimate orchestra in 2006, the Symphony again played at churches in Sun City West and Sun City until 2010. In January 2011, the Symphony, renamed the West Valley Symphony in 2004, moved to the Vista in Surprise, where it continues to perform a six-concert season.




