From 1980 until the closure and demolition of the Sundome, thousands of people enjoyed the talents of Sun City West residents who shared their varied skills in an annual variety show.

The variety show was the idea of Jerry Svendsen, vice president of public relations for DEVCO, who formed a "Committee of Seven" to plan the first event.

Svendsen's wife, Marion; along with Bob and Bess Porterfield; Roy Orwat; and Ed and Dorothy Fromm assembled about 50 volunteers for the first show.

The Sun Cities Holiday Variety Show opened on Nov. 19, 1980. Complimentary tickets (courtesy of DEVCO) were given to residents of both Sun City and Sun City West to attend the event at the Sundome. Although a misspelling in the program identified the event as a "variety" show, this first performance was a great success.

More than 6,000 people attended the second Holiday Variety Show on Nov. 11, 1981, and attendance continued to increase. In 1984, a charitable aspect was added to the event. Attendees were asked to bring canned goods to the performances to donate to St. Vincent de Paul and the Salvation Army. Admission was still free, but sponsored by Valley National Bank (later Bank One).





negate our vote and our ability to enforce parking altogether if it becomes law.

We are asking for your help in contacting the Legislature to throw this bill out!

The March election will include an important question, required due to a change in state law, about whether the Association can continue enforcing CC&Rs related to street parking. The Rec Centers currently enforces RV, boat, trailer, utility and other long-term vehicle parking on our streets. The state Legislature passed a new law in 2023 that will remove that authority, unless residents reaffirm it. Without a positive vote by a quorum of members, the Rec Centers and its CC&R Department will have no jurisdiction over whether RVs and other large vehicles can remain parked on the streets

To fill the remainder of this term, which runs through June 30, the top vote-getter in the election will be seated immediately to finish Stannebein's term. That person will then begin their own full, three-year term on July 1, joining the next two highest vote-getters.





Q: I think my ball is stuck in the ground, but I can't find it – how do I proceed? A: If you can't find your ball within three minutes, it is lost. Because it is lost, you must return to the spot of your previous stroke and play another ball for one penalty stroke (see Rule 18.2b).



Four things motorists question about cyclists:

• Why don't cyclists move to the shoulder when a vehicle is coming behind? Often debris, gravel or obstacles on the shoulder make it unsafe for cyclists. Or bikes turning left and need to move into the proper turn lane. Legally, bicycles can use the entire lane.

• Why do cyclists sometimes ride two abreast? It's legal, same as for motorcycles. There is safety in numbers since it's easier to see a group. Most cyclists ride single file when they know a vehicle is approaching behind.

• Isn't it better for bikes to ride against traffic or on the sidewalk? Sidewalks aren't safe for bikes. Bikes are legally required to ride the same direction as traffic.

• Why do cyclists bunch up at a traffic light or stop sign instead of getting over to the

right? Bikes should not pass cars on the right or left at stops but "take the lane" as a group to prevent cars from turning in front of or into cyclists. When behind cars, we follow them through the intersection then ride single file as soon as possible. A third of bike-vehicle accidents involves making a turn.

• Why do cyclists bunch up at a traffic light or stop sign instead of getting over to the right? The club does not pass cars on the right or left at stops but "take the lane" as a group to prevent cars from turning in front of or into cyclists. When behind cars, we follow them through the intersection then ride single file. A third of bikevehicle accidents involves making a turn.

With Jackie Iverson leading the group, participants learned new techniques, improved their skills, and had fun, too.

"This is not a race and it always takes some quilters longer than others to finish," Iverson said. "The clues have you make enough units for a queen size quilt. This year we all opted to make fewer units and use them in smaller projects."

This was Marilyn Zenz's first year doing the mystery quilt. She used the blocks to make a table runner and a table topper, which is set on-point with setting blocks that mimic the layout of the larger quilt.

Marian Clish has participated all three years and she's adept at making modifications and using alternate settings.

This year Clish adjusted the unit size to take advantage of her AccuQuilt Go! cutter. She



made two sets of everything in two different sizes, giving her enough blocks to make three lap quilts. One has the larger blocks set on-point and one has smaller blocks set with sashing. Iverson and Jean Heinen still have work to do on their proj-

Heinen is still deciding on a final layout but brought two blocks to show.



For the sixth annual show in 1985, the committee decided on a patriotic theme, "This is America." More than 7,000 people attended. Free tickets and canned goods collections continued in 1986 for a show "We're Taking a themed Cruise."

In 1987, the Variety Show committee agreed to charge \$3 admission with the proceeds going to support equipment for the Del E. Webb Memorial Hospital, then under construction. More than \$24,000 was raised from an audience of more than 8,000.

Mike Tarr directed the "West of Broadway" show in 1988. His wife, Jeanne, later devoted years of creativity to the shows.

In 1989, ticket prices increased to \$4 and spectators raised more than \$42,000 for hospital equipment. Ticket prices were raised again in 1990 for "Hurray for Hollywood," directed by Christopher Brown.

In 1991, the "Westward Ho," show included a team of live horses that was a great hit with the audience. Popular themes continued. The 1994 theme, "Happiness Is ..." honored the Phoenix Suns. The 1995 theme honored the mili-

tary with "Whee the People." The 1998 show, "It's a Small World" had six children and a dog among its 250 performers.

The 1998 show earned honorable mention in the Western Maricopa Coalition (WEST-MARC) "Best of the West" Sports and Entertainment cat-Two years later, egory. "Everything Old is New Again" earned first place.

By 2003, as Sun City West celebrated its 25th anniversary, attendees at the annual Variety

Show had raised more than \$1 million for Del E. Webb Memorial Hospital.

The closure of the Sundome brought an end to these annual performances of talented residents of Sun City West.

cies that protect the fiscal health of the Association to take care of current financial needs as well as ensuring that the Association has financial stability well into the future. With the assistance of the Budget and Finance Committee, the Governing Board oversees and verifies that our Association is transparently operated with strict adherence to our governing documents as well as county, state and federal laws and statutes.

RCSCW is on rock-solid ground fiscally, and the Association is debt-free. We have a system in place that tracks our capital items with a schedule of where they are in their useful life, when they should be repaired or replaced and how much each will cost.

We have a vigorous Reserve Fund that currently sits at a dollar amount that could fund half of our repair and replacement expenses for the next 30 years. Over the last five years the Association has spent more than \$35 million to keep our assets in tip-top shape, and our Reserve Fund has still grown. Our dues provide the best value of any national planned community, even more so when you consider the numerous opportunities provided by our golf courses, Sports Pavilion, recreation centers, pools, Library and chartered clubs.

I remember a bit of advice that I received when I first became a Director. "The Board members that came before you were conscientious people who did the best that they could. Honor their contributions and consider any changes carefully. Quick changes or reversals of policies need careful consideration for any unintended consequences, rather than a knee-jerk reaction to personal agendas.'

While it's natural that each new Director feels the need to make their mark on the Association, I feel it is a red flag when a candidate talks about changing things before they get elected and understand how things actually work.

PARKING REFERENDUM

The March Election will include an important question about whether the Association can continue enforcing CC&Rs related to street parking. The Rec Centers enforces RV, boat, trailer, utility and other long-term vehicle parking. The Legislature passed a new law in 2023 that will remove that authority, unless residents reaffirm it. Without a positive vote by a quorum of members, the Rec Centers and its CC&R Department will have no jurisdiction over whether RVs and other large vehicles can remain parked on the streets indefinitely.

IMPORTANT UPDATE: Members are advised another bill is pending with the Legislature in the current session that would eliminate the ability of all HOAs and planned communities to regulate parking, regardless of an affirmative vote by the community to continue enforcement. This new bill, HB2470, is still working its way through legislative committees. •Only Owner Members in good standing may vote. Tenants and Associates may not vote.

•Each Owner Member must have their own email address.
