SCW General Manager resigns

After more than five years with the Recreation Centers of Sun City West, General Manager Bill Schwind has resigned, effective March 22.

Citing personal reasons, Schwind said he consulted with his family before making the decision to leave public administration and pursue other interests.

"I have nothing but thanks and appreciation for the wonderful opportunity that the Recreation Centers of Sun City West has provided us," Schwind wrote. "The professional management team I have had the pleasure of working with are extremely proficient and each are experts in their fields. That being said, the Association will remain in good hands during your search and selection of my successor."

Schwind started with the Association on Jan. 22, 2019, succeeding former General

Manager Mike Whiting, who had served for 15 years. The Board conducted a national search at that time to fill the vacancy.

The Board has approved a special committee to work on finding a new GM. Keep an eye on the enews for the latest.

Hurley removed as president

The Recreation Centers of News went to press. No addi-Sun City West Governing Board held an Executive Session on March 12 and voted to remove Tim Hurly as president.

The action follows an earlier decision by the Board to suspend Hurley for 30 days. That suspension, which prevented Hurley from participating in any Governing Board activities and temporarily revoked his recreation center privileges, ended on March 25.

The March 12 decision was announced by Interim Board President Lisa Vines following the closed session. The new president was appointed at the Regular Meeting on March 21; news of the appointment was made after the Rec Center

tional information about the Executive Session was available.

Bylaw 5.7 allows the Board to vote to fill officer vacancies, and with the new officer fulfilling the term until June 30.

Additionally, Bylaw 5.06 states: "Any officer may be removed from office by the majority vote of the Governing Board at any regular or special meeting called for that purpose whenever the Governing Board determines that such removal serves the best interests of the Association."

Use pre-emergent to avoid a larger weed problem

The CC&R department is reminding homeowners that now is the time of year when weeds are growing. They have started to pop up in yards all around our community.

Prevention is the key! The unanimous advice from experts is to apply a pre¬emergent every six months, preferably in the Spring and again in the fall (September,) to stop weeds from germinating.

The pre-emergent should be "watered down" after applying to get down to the seeds and prevent germination from taking place.

Once you see the weeds growing, applying a preemergent will not kill them. At that point you need to apply a "post- \neg emergent." (Please note that most weed killers must have a certain temperature to be effective \neg read the product label).

Also, the weeds we are seeing this year are part of the sunflower, tumbleweed, or native plant families, and some weed killers will not work on them. A special formulation may be needed to kill these weeds. Ask an exterminator.

Eliminating weeds is a three-step process:

• Step one - Apply a preemergent.

• Step two - Apply a weed killer as

quickly as possible to prevent the weeds from developing and dropping seeds.

• Step three - Remove the dead weeds from your yard after they have died.

A pet-friendly option is available: Vinegar is also an effective weed killer. Unlike commercial weed killers, vinegar is ecofriendly and won't harm the environment, people or pets.

Also, add table salt to vinegar to destroy weeds forever!

Just make sure not to use salt on soil in a location you may ever want something to grow, as the solution will make sure that nothing grows in that spot again.

1. Pour 1 gallon of white vinegar into a bucket. Everyday 5 to 10 percent household white vinegar is fine for this weed killer.

 Add 1 cup of table salt. Stir until all the salt dissolves completely.
 Stir in 1 tablespoon of liquid dishwash-

s. Sur in T tablespoon of inquid disfiwashing soap. This will act as a surface-¬active agent and will make the vinegar and salt solution adhere to the weeds more efficiently.
4. Funnel the weed killer into a plastic

spray bottle. 5. Saturate the weeds with the solution on a dry, sunny day. Cover all the surfaces well with the solution. The plants soaked with this solution will die within a few days. Warning: They won't be back and nothing else will ever grow there.

Civic organization continues to keep SCW looking beautiful

Volunteer organizations have played a major role in the history and success of Sun City West, and one of the most popular - and visible - volunteer organizations is the one that can be seen cleaning the streets of our community.

Sun City West PRIDES volunteers are known for their commitment to keeping the community clean, and their bright orange vests make them easy to recognize along the community's streets. The history of the PRIDES -Particular Residents Involved Doing Environmental Services - can be traced to the early days of Sun City West.

Joan Barnett and her husband were living in Sun City when they became one of the first to purchase a home in Del Webb's newest retirement community, Sun City West. The Barnetts would visit the new community nearly every day to track the construction progress of their new home. Construction debris, overgrown weeds and unkempt streets prompted Joan to complain to her husband, "Sun City is so clean, and Sun City West is so dirty!"

After hearing enough of these complaints, Mr. Barnett finally challenged his wife to either "shut up or do something about it!" Never one to shirk a good challenge, Joan sought out other Sun City West residents who shared similar concerns about the untidy appearance of Sun City West.

Along with Owen Moore, Charlie Czlapinski, Charles Borton and Howard Cain, a committee was formed to see what could be done. Joan sought advice from Dr. Laurence Allen, who had overseen the Sun City PRIDES, and after one phone call the committee had "all they needed to know."

They placed an ad in the local newspaper announcing

an organizational meeting for residents interested in keeping Sun City West clean.

On March 8, 1982, 44 people signed up at a meeting and the Sun City West PRIDES was born. Joan served as the organization's first president and Owen as secretary.

The timing was perfect.

Maricopa County only maintained the median strip along R.H. Johnson Boulevard twice a year. The sidewalk and walls were on community property not county property. The Del E. Webb Development Company (DEVCO) had been trying to recruit Master Gardeners and volunteers from the local garden club to maintain these areas – but not having much success.

The PRIDES immediately stepped in to fill the void. DEVCO donated shovels, a van and other equipment while the county provided liability insurance, safety vests, hard hats, trash bags and more. Joan would design the first PRIDES logo, which members sewed on their vests and caps.

The organization was introduced to the community in the April 1982 edition of the Sun City West Activities Calendar, published by DEVCO. The rest, as they say, is history.

Members can still be seen every Saturday cleaning up "beautifying" and streets throughout the community. Today, more than 300 members maintain 26 miles of common areas - trimming shrubs and trees, monitoring irrigation systems, planting new foliage and pulling weeds. The nonprofit organization works closely with Maricopa County, the Recreation Centers, PORA, the Posse, and with the Sun City West Foundation, which provides the PRIDES with a 3,500-square-foot warehouse at Stardust and R.H. Johnson boulevards.

Protect against vehicale theft; home secuity tips

cent months in the motor vehicle category. Lumped together are cars, trucks, utility trailers, motorcycles and golf carts. We believe that golf carts are the vast majority of stolen vehicles while cars and trucks comprise thefts from vehicles. The following are some suggestions:

1. Park in your garage whenever possible with the garage door down.

2. If you park any place outside a closed garage, don't leave items of value or keys in the vehicle.

3. Many golf cars have the same key and these are easily purchased. Disable your golf car if you leave it parked with a kill switch, tire boot or steering wheel lock.

4. Take your garage door opener with you. Don't leave it in an exposed place.

There are about 17,000 homes in Sun City West and the number of crimes is extremely low but the only acceptable number is zero. In the first six

days of February 2024, Lex-SHERIFFISI isNexis (reports from MCSO) shows burglaries three and one stolen vehicle. Some things to

consider for home security:

1. Make sure every window and door is locked, especially at night or while gone. Use dead bolt locks on exterior doors where possible and wooden pieces in the track to prevent movement of glass sliders.

2. Keep your garage door down even when home - day or night.

3. Secure windows that can be opened. Use clamps, wood pieces or locks.

4. Connect a lamp to a timer near a window that gives the appearance of someone home. even with the blinds or drapes closed.

5. Place a padlock on your electrical panel.

6. Don't forget windows and doors, especially sliders, on the sides and back of the house. These areas are less visible from the street.

7. Doorbell cameras help but are not a complete solution. Call 911 for all emergencies. Posse phone 623-584-5808.



Ever wonder how a parachute is packaged? Master Sgt. Michael Hinojosa explained the meticulous process that protects the lives of pilots who depend on their parachute if they must eject the plane. Along with the 'chute, the pilot has a state-of-the-art high-tech helmet and a life-preserver box containing everything from waterproof matches, compass, dry food (not very tasty we were told), and lifeboat.







Frequently Asked Questions

Fairways and Rough (General Area): **Relief Options for Unplayable Ball**

Q: I don't think I can play my ball as it lies (unplayable) what are my options?

A: If you don't want to or decide you

cannot play your ball as it lies, you have the option to decide that it is unplayable for one penalty stroke (see Rule 19.2). This will give you three options on where you

may drop your ball away from the spot where it came to rest. (1) You may play a ball at the spot of your previous stroke (see Rule 19.2a). (2) Take back-on-the-line relief

(see Rule 19.2b). (3) Drop within two club-lengths and not nearer the hole than where your ball came to rest (see Rule 19.2c).



Quilts are their cause

Figuring out the logistics can be mind-boggling: How does a group of women turn almost 60 quilt tops into fully completed quilts in eight hours a month?

Quilts for a Cause, a special-interest group within Rip 'N' Sew, has an answer.

"We're doing them assembly line style," said Linda Logan, who cochairs the quilt group. "No one is doing a whole quilt unless (the quilts) are donated that way."

Club members volunteer for all the work, including the piecing of a quilt top, which is done outside of the group's time.

On a quilt work day, volunteers layer the quilt sandwich, stitch together the layers, trim excess material along the edges, hand sew a small seam and, finally, hand tie or machine tack the center portion of each quilt. That last step keeps all the quilt layers together through usage and laundry.

"People are very versatile in what they do," Logan said, but they do have preferences about what they do on Quilts for a Cause twice-monthly work days. To offer choices, Logan tries to have about five quilts in each of the five stages needed to complete a quilt.

"That's 25 or so total in the stages," she said.

And each of those quilts is needed. "We donated 28 quilts to Hospice


