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SCW voters elect new Directors

Recreation Centers of Sun City West voters on March 25 chose three new Directors and maintained the Association's ability to continue enforcing parking regulations.

The referendum regarding parking enforcement passed by an overwhelming margin of 96.5 percent in favor of maintaining the Association's ability to

regulate the roadways, and 3.5 percent voting against.

"We appreciate members turning out and voting so overwhelmingly in favor of allowing our CC&R Department to continue doing what we're doing," said Property Manager James Riley. "This yes vote means we can continue maintaining Sun City West the way our members have come to ex-

On the Governing Board front, voters chose Jolene Piaskowski, Dennis Horvath and Rudy Grom as the newest Directors. Piaskowski immediately filled the remaining term of Harry Stannebein, who resigned Feb. 6 for personal rea-

sons. Piaskowski will finish that term through June 30, and then on July 1 will join Horvath and Grom to begin their own full three-year terms.

The three newest Directors will join Tim Hurley, Jack Leary, Christine Novello, Dick Rhoades, Alan Schlemmer, and Kay Williams, who continue on the Board. Terms for President Lisa Vines and Director Terry Hamman end June 30.

The Governing Board is comprised of nine Owner-Members, all of whom are volunteers and receive no compensation. They serve three-year staggered terms, with one-third of the Board turning over every year.

This year's election was the second-highest on record, and included perhaps the highest number of candidates, with eight vying for the three positions. A total of 10,142 votes were cast (39.1 percent).

- Nick Turner, 3,548 votes

- Ronald Aames, 1,692 votes

'Bee' warned: It's swarming season for honey-gatherers

With the desert in full bloom, residents can expect to see more bees flitting about, collecting nectar and pollen grains to convert into honey. And that means not only more bee sightings, but also greater potential for injury.

The Rec Centers takes bee issues seriously and encourages members to report any bee issues on the golf courses or other Rec Centers properties to the manager of those facilities who can investigate and decide on the best course of action to keep everyone safe.

One thing to note is that a swarm of bees is different than a hive. Bees can swarm and land in one area for a few hours, and while they might look like they've taken up permanent residence, they are usually just resting or waiting for evening to move on. In most cases of a resting swarm, the Rec Centers will rope off the area and put up signs to warn people away. In the case of an aggressive swarm or the formation of a permanent hive, more permanent action will be taken to remove the threat.

Whether it is a swarm or a hive, bees can be aggressive and they are certainly unpredictable. Do not take chances, do not try to investigate on your own, and do not harass them! A docile swarm or hive can turn angry quickly and result in serious harm or death.

Anyone being attacked by a swarm of bees should seek shelter immediately, either in a car or residence. Jumping into a pool or other body of water is not advisable, as the angry bees will wait for their intended victim to emerge for air.

Bees on private property will be the responsibility of the homeowner. For additional information, check out Maricopa County's "Bee Safe" brochure available online at maricopa.gov and search for "Bee Safe."

RCSCW capital projects may affect summer activities

RCSCW Capital Projects Manager It's that time of year again when we all begin planning for

when we all begin planning for the spring and summer. Each year, I diligently plan for the next Fiscal Year's capital projects.

This is no easy task due to the timelines, by policy, for Governing Board budget approval by the end of May each year for next fiscal year's expenditures.

Ultimately, best laid plans are defined per this final approval of capital projects. Generally, the items from our Reserve Study are predominantly approved and most important as they are existing assets of RCSCW and require repair and replacement in the fiscal year proposed.

The primary purpose of this memo is to inform the community of project planning schedules being made for some key areas so we can all make plans to use other facilities during closures. Planning and dates are always subject to change due to the short planning cycle provided per policy and approvals, material availability, and weather conditions for outdoor projects.

Palm Ridge's Swim and Fitness Center will incur the greatest impact from project scheduling starting late spring 2024.

We are tentatively planning for the following projects:

JUNE

Palm Ridge Indoor Pool - Tile Walls Wainscot Replacement (previous fiscal year ap-

proved project); approximately a four- to six-week project, interior and exterior pool closure only.

JULY

Palm Ridge Exterior Pool - Deck Resurface; approximately a two- to three-week project, interior and exterior pool closure only.

Palm Ridge Interior Pool - Deck Resurface; approximately overlapping two-week project immediately after tile wainscot completed, interior and exterior pool closure only.

Palm Ridge Pickleball Facility - Courts 1-10 resurfacing; trhee-week project, remaining courts will stay open.

JULY - AUGUST

Palm Ridge Restroom Partitions - Replacement; during other projects in progress.

Palm Ridge Activities
Building - Hardwoods and
Maintenance Closure; July
22nd- August 9th 2024 full

building closure.

AUGUST

Palm Ridge Fitness Room - Cardio & Strength Equipment Replacement; tentative due to availability and lead time needed to receive equipment, approximately two-day closure of entire Swim and Fitness Building due to no access to Lobby.

I will provide specific closure timeframes for Palm Ridge as soon as all information from each of the project's selected vendors has been received. Please remember per policy no funding or contract agreements can be finalized before July 1.

The vast majority of the remaining approved FY24-25 capital projects will be scheduled throughout 2024 and 2025, with very little impact to the community overall. Those remaining project closures will be posted at a future date as determined by RCSCW.

Use pre-emergent to avoid a larger weed problem

The CC&R department is reminding homeowners that now is the time of year when weeds are growing. They have started to pop up in yards all around our community.

Prevention is the key! The unanimous advice from experts is to apply a pre¬emergent every six months, preferably in the Spring and again in the fall (September,) to stop weeds from germinating.

The pre-emergent should be "watered down" after applying to get down to the seeds and prevent germination from taking place.

Once you see the weeds growing, applying a preemergent will not kill them. At that point you need to apply a "post-¬emergent." (Please note that most weed killers must have a certain temperature to be effective ¬ read the product label).

Also, the weeds we are seeing this

year are part of the sunflower, tumbleweed, or native plant families, and some weed killers will not work on them. A special formulation may be needed to kill these weeds. Ask an exterminator.

Eliminating weeds is a three-step process:

- Step one Apply a preemergent.
- Step two Apply a weed killer as quickly as possible to prevent the weeds from developing and dropping seeds.
- Step three Remove the dead weeds from your yard after they have died

A pet-friendly option is available: Vinegar is also an effective weed killer. Unlike commercial weed killers, vinegar is ecofriendly and won't harm the environment, people or pets.

Also, add table salt to vinegar to destroy weeds forever!

Just make sure not to use salt on soil

in a location you may ever want something to grow, as the solution will make sure that nothing grows in that spot again.

- 1. Pour 1 gallon of white vinegar into a bucket. Everyday 5 to 10 percent household white vinegar is fine for this weed killer.
- 2. Add 1 cup of table salt. Stir until all the salt dissolves completely.
- 3. Stir in 1 tablespoon of liquid dishwashing soap. This will act as a surface-¬active agent and will make the vinegar and salt solution adhere to the weeds more efficiently.
- 4. Funnel the weed killer into a plastic spray bottle.
- 5. Saturate the weeds with the solution on a dry, sunny day. Cover all the surfaces well with the solution. The plants soaked with this solution will die within a few days. Warning: They won't be back and nothing else will ever grow there.

Posse faced early challenges

Sun City West residents are accustomed to feeling safe in their homes and feeling comfortable walking at night. They are used to seeing the black Posse vehicles on patrol and Posse members directing traffic after a community event.

In its formative years, the Posse faced numerous challenges. Soon after Sun City West began to develop, the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office recognized the need for law enforcement for the new community. The Sheriff's Office had neither the finances nor the manpower to provide residents their deserved protection.

Under Arizona state law, the sheriff has the authority to form a Posse to assist in law enforcement. Deputy Don Blankship was assigned to direct the formation of the Sun City West Posse. Michael Komar of the Del Webb Corp. and members of the company's legal staff helped draft a charter that was submitted to the Arizona Commission of Incorporation on June 11, 1979, and approved by the Sheriff's Office on June 29.

The Posse began with 12 members and quickly grew to 20. Four members completed Posse and advanced training courses, including the academy, and were certified Q.A.P. to carry weapons.

Each of the four were assigned as a duty officer and had one week when they were on call 24 hours per day, for seven days. If the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office needed to communicate, they called the duty officer at home where the phone was manned by the duty officer's spouse who then relayed the call.

In the Posse's early years, the members wore yellow jumpsuits and patrolled the community in their own cars or golf cars, attaching magnetic decals to both front doors for identification. The first patrol car was purchased in 1981. Posse members used citizen band radios for communication.

The Posse's first traffic control assignment was handling the five-day LPGA tournament at Hillcrest Golf Course, sponsored by the Del E. Webb Corp., in March 1980. At-

narrative during our tour of the lake. In the distance the tops of Four Peaks glistened with snow and contrasted with the colorful granite and basalt cliffs surrounding us. We saw a variety of birds riding the air currents, including hawks, herons, and eagles. When we spotted a Bighorn sheep perched on a rock, Captain Dan stopped the boat so we could watch it jump nimbly up the cliff.

Saguaro cactus gave the lake its name, and they've learned to grow on the sunny side of the hills to avoid the winter temperature drops. There is one towering Crested Saguaro on the lake, far away from its cousin at the Arizona Botanical Gardens.

Saguaro Lake was formed by the Stewart Mountain Dam, the

last dam to be built on the Salt River in 1930. The dam generates hydroelectric power and prevents flooding on the Salt River, while the lake provides habitat and areas for recreation.

tendance exceeded expectations and the Posse had to direct 2,000 cars a day. Fortunately, help came from Sun City.

The Sundome Center of Per-

forming Arts soon began having capacity audiences with as many as 104 performances a year. The Posse directed all Sundome traffic until Arizona State University took over the Sundome.

When the Del E. Webb Corp.

recognized the need for a headquarters for the Posse other than a living room or a garage, the company provided a 12 x 60 foot trailer equipped with electricity and air-conditioning and established a first base radio station. In 1987, the Posse moved into its permanent headquarters in the Sun City West Foundation Building.

Although there have been many changes for the Posse over the past 45 years, its main purpose of protecting and serving the community has not changed. Operated by volunteers and funded by donations and funds earned by providing traffic control at local events, the Sun City West Posse continues to protect and serve 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

Club 52 sees odds-defying hand

Poker can seem to be a very docile game, but then suddenly, without notice it will turn into a very cruel game.

Members of Club 52 witnessed how cruel the game could be in a recent poker tournament. With the field reduced to 16, Dave Vandever looked down to see a pocket pair. Since you are only dealt a pocket pair approximately 6 percent of the time, Vandever pushed all-in believing he likely had the best hand

However, Mike Case called the bet, and Vandever realized he may be in trouble. The best he could hope for was that Case had over cards or a smaller pair.

When the player's hole cards were revealed, Case had a pair of queens against Vandever's pair of eights. The "flop" produced an eight, which helped Vandever, but also a queen for Case. Vandever was now back in the position of needing some help.

The "turn" card was placed on the board, was another eight that gave Vandever quad eights, an almost unbeatable hand. He had beaten the odds against him and was now far ahead of Case, with just one card to go - the "river."

However, poker can be a cruel game, as the "river" card hit the table with the fourth queen revealed, giving Case the win and crushing Vandever's tournament life. By this time, with all of the excitement and groans coming from the table, almost everyone in the room was trying to find out what was happening

How extreme this sequence of events was, can be understood if you realize that each player has: 6 percent chance of being dealt a pocket pair; 11 percent chance of improving a pocket pair to trips on the "flop;" 2.2 percent chance of improving a pocket pair to trips on the "turn" or improving trips to quads on the "turn;" and a 2.2 percent chance of improving trips to quads on the "river."

In this single hand, all of these seemingly insurmountable odds were faced by one player or the other, to have the hand play out as it did. The chance of two players at an eight-player table doing all of this about .0002 percent. The odds are about 1-to-500,000.

Congratulations to Case, who continued on to be one of the tournament winners. Condolences to Vandever on a truly bad beat on the "river."
